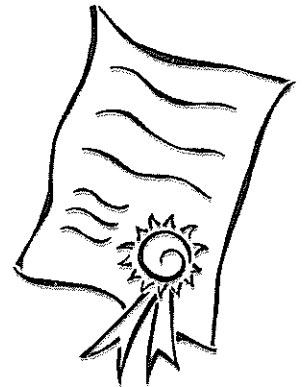


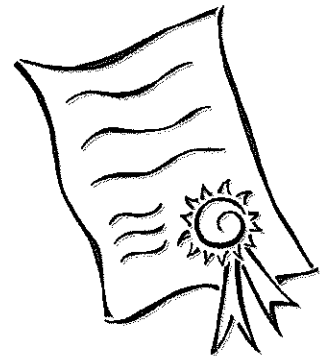
BOARD OF REVIEW

A Junior Soldier Honor Award Board of Review will be requested by the corps officer when one or more Junior Soldiers have, in the judgment of the Junior Soldier Sergeant or group leader, met all of the stipulated requirements, including memorizing the Salvation Army doctrines and demonstrating their knowledge of the required subjects outlined for the Junior Soldier Honor Award.



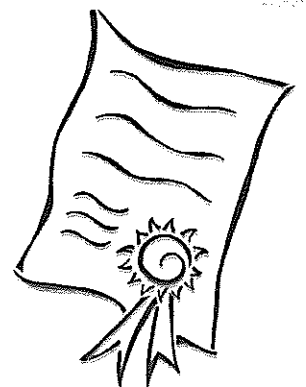
The corps officer will contact the Divisional Youth Secretary advising him/her of the names of the young people who are ready for the Board of Review. The Divisional Youth Secretary will advise the corps officer of a suitable date for the Board of Review. When the date is set, the applicants for the Honor Award will be notified by the corps officer or the Junior Soldier Sergeant.

The occasion of the Board of Review will be one of importance, although every effort should be made to make the applicants for the Award feel comfortable and at ease.



The Divisional Youth Secretary and at least one other officer or local officer appointed by him/her shall comprise the Board of Review. It is preferable that officers or locals immediately responsible for training the applicant(s) should not be included. Those chosen to serve as members of the Board should be well acquainted with the Junior Soldier Honor Award.

The applicants will meet individually with the Board of Review. Each applicant will be asked questions by the Divisional Youth Secretary on all of the required subjects. Each applicant will individually recite all of the eleven points of doctrine before the Board of Review.



The Divisional Youth Secretary and the members of the Board of Review will be advised of children with special personality problems or physical challenges when such may have a bearing upon their performance before the Board of Review.



Board of Review (continued)

The function of the Board of Review is to give opportunity to applicants to demonstrate their knowledge of the special training received in the basic aspects of Salvationism. Since most of the children will approach the experience of being examined by the Board of Review with some nervousness, the members of the Board will need to display a friendly, understanding spirit to help the children to do their very best.

The Junior Soldier Sergeant and the corps officer will protect the children from the unpleasant experience of not passing the Board of Review by making sure that the youngsters are ready and possess the necessary knowledge and experience. While the members of the Board of Review will be understanding and sympathetic, taking into consideration nervousness, etc., there will be no exceptions made for any young person who does not meet every stipulated requirement of the Honor Award.

The Honor Award was never intended to be given to every Junior Soldier, although every Junior Soldier should be encouraged to study and train for the Award. Those who have earned the Honor Award are Junior Soldiers of special distinction and merit. They are juniors who have studied and worked with diligence and fervor. They have learned basic Salvation Army service, history and creed. Every effort will be put forth to keep the Honor Award on a high level of achievement.
