Keep a daily devotional/prayer journal for four (4) weeks.

Visualize a Scripture verse from the Romans Road. Explain and teach it in Sunday school.

Plan and participate in a meeting for any group adult residence.

Interview a faithful Salvationist. Find out when s/he became saved. How has s/he impacted the life of the corps?

Help teach a Sunday school class for four (4) weeks.

Interview a social worker about his/her work with the Army and report on the interview.

Share the plan of salvation with three (3) unsaved friends and write an account of what happened.

Make up a Bible game and teach it to a Sunday school class.

Get names from your corps officer of people in the corps to pray for and write notes of encouragement for one (1) month.

Write a report on which part of the Junior Soldier Promise is most difficult for you to live out.

Memorize the Beatitudes or the Ten Commandments.

Do a bulletin board on how your corps fulfills the Christian mandate in Matthew 25:31-41.

Interview your corps officer and report on what s/he does.

Make a visual aid for teaching one of the doctrines.

Write a report on the Army's position on alcohol, AIDS, or abortion, and tell how it relates to what Jesus taught.

Write and present a children's devotional.

Learn the books of the Bible.

Visit an elderly person (who is not a relative) and take a small gift that you made.

Understudy a local officer for four (4) weeks. Write about what you learned.

Make a model of the tabernacle. Be able to explain its components.

Adopt a cadet for four (4) months (write, pray, provide for needs).

Prepare a stewardship chart. Outline how you spend your time, talent, tithe and money for (4) weeks.

Create a skit or puppet script based upon Scripture and perform it in Sunday school.

Adopt a missionary for four (4) months (write, pray, provide for needs).

Write out your personal testimony and share it in an adult meeting.

Choose a Bible person who has influenced you and create a book, video, song or other creative presentation about his/her life.

Using *The Salvation Army Yearbook*, choose two (2) countries and find out two (2) special services that the Army provides in each (i.e. schools for the blind, child care centers).

Design your own project. (If the Junior Soldier has an idea for his/her own project, approval may be given by the Divisional Youth Secretary.)

Memorize the Romans Road and present the plan of salvation (Romans 3:23; 6:23; 9:10-11).

Volunteer in two (2) social service programs of your corps (day care, soup kitchen, seasonal). Make a photo journal of what you've learned about the Army's mission in the world today.

Design your own project. (If the Junior Soldier has an idea for his/her own project, approval may be given by the Divisional Youth Secretary.)

Basic information regarding Junior Bible Bowl:

The objectives of Junior Bible Bowl are to plant the Word of God in children's hearts and minds, to excite children with the Word of God; and to help children develop Bible study habits they will continue throughout life.

The program is a Bible study which is geared for children. The lessons and activities are fun and are designed to aid children in the understanding and application of God's Word to their lives. The game of Junior Bible Bowl is an incentive to memorize Scripture verses and to remember the Bible stories.

The children are divided into teams. The questions and multiple choice answers are read twice. Each child holds up the numbered index card which corresponds with the correct answer. Points are awarded to each child with the correct answer.
